

READING FROM THE ACTS OF THE APOSTLES Acts of the Apostles 8:26-40 An angel of the Lord said to Philip, "Get up and go toward the south to the road that goes down from Jerusalem to Gaza." (This is a wilderness road.) So he got up and went. Now there was an Ethiopian eunuch, a court official of the Candace, queen of the Ethiopians, in charge of her entire treasury. He had come to Jerusalem to worship and was returning home; seated in his chariot, he was reading the prophet Isaiah. Then the Spirit said to Philip, "Go over to this chariot and join it." So Philip ran up to it and heard him reading the prophet Isaiah. He asked, "Do you understand what you are reading?" He replied, "How can I, unless someone guides me?" And he invited Philip to get in and sit beside him. Now the passage of the scripture that he was reading was this: "Like a sheep he was led to the slaughter, and like a lamb silent before its shearer, so he does not open his mouth. In his humiliation justice was denied him. Who can describe his generation? For his life is taken away from the earth." The eunuch asked Philip, "About whom, may I ask you, does the prophet say this, about himself or about someone else?" Then Philip began to speak, and starting with this scripture, he proclaimed to him the good news about Jesus. As they were going along the road, they came to some water; and the eunuch said, "Look, here is water! What is to prevent me from being baptized?" He commanded the chariot to stop, and both of them, Philip and the eunuch, went down into the water, and Philip baptized him. When they came up out of the water, the Spirit of the Lord snatched Philip away; the eunuch saw him no more, and went on his way rejoicing. But Philip found himself at Azotus, and as he was passing through the region, he proclaimed the good news to all the towns until he came to Caesarea.

READING FROM THE EPISTLES

1 John 4:7-21

Beloved, let us love one another, because love is from God; everyone who loves is born of God and knows God. Whoever does not love does not know God, for God is love. God's love was revealed among us in this way: God sent his only Son into the world so that we might live through him. In this is love, not that we loved God but that he loved us and sent his Son to be the atoning sacrifice for our sins. Beloved, since God loved us so much, we also ought to love one another. No one has ever seen God; if we love one another, God lives in us, and his love is perfected in us.

By this we know that we abide in him and he in us, because he has given us of his Spirit. And we have seen and do testify that the Father has sent his Son as the Savior of the world. God abides in those who confess that Jesus is the Son of God, and they abide in God. So we have known and believe the love that God has for us.

God is love, and those who abide in love abide in God, and God abides in them. Love has been perfected among us in this: that we may have boldness on the day of judgment, because as he is, so are we in this world. There is no fear in love, but perfect love casts out fear; for fear has to do with punishment, and whoever fears has not reached perfection in love. We love because he first loved us. Those who say, "I love God," and hate their brothers or sisters, are liars; for those who do not love a brother or sister whom they have seen, cannot love God whom they have not seen. The commandment we have from him is this: those who love God must love their brothers and sisters also.



Holy and gracious Father: In your infinite love you made us for yourself; and, when we had fallen into sin and become subject to evil and death, you, in your

mercy, sent Jesus Christ, your only and eternal Son, to share our human nature, to live and die as one of us, to reconcile us to you, the God and Father of all. He stretched out his arms upon the cross, and offered himself in obedience to your will, a perfect sacrifice for the whole world.

On the night he was handed over to suffering and death, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

Announcements

From the Vestry

Trinity's Vestry met for the regular March meeting on Palm Sunday 3/24/24, the usual 4th Sunday meeting. The Vestry would like to share with the congregation the following information from the February and March meetings:

- The 2023 Parochial Report for the congregation was approved (and submitted to The Episcopal Church on 2/29/24). Compared with 2022, Trinity held steady in membership and Christmas service attendance. We saw increases in average Sunday attendance (up 16%) and mission activities, and added a deacon! Trinity's future financial outlook remains challenging as revenue has decreased which increases reliance upon income from endowment investments.
- On 2/24, the Vestries of 2023 and 2024 and Sabeth+ met with the Rev. Arienne
 Davison for an annual Mutual Ministry Review. Together, we identified some
 values of Christian leadership that emerged from our ministry together this past
 year, including the importance of prayer, communicating mutual expectations,
 listening, patience, and love.
- Accounting firm Battershell and Nichols, who have a division for church accounting, will take charge of bookkeeping and payroll functions, as of April 1, 2024.
- The Vestry is investigating options for increasing revenue from the Skyline Parking Garage. Frank Greenman presented some options at the February meeting, and the Vestry is pursuing more information from two vendors.
- Trinity received applications for the position of **Sexton** for two weeks, ending April 4.
- The Vestry has begun **identifying route options for Road Trip 2024**, in which the congregation will learn more about who we are as a congregation and in our neighborhood through gathering information with one another and with our neighbors. The route will be selected in April.

Music Notes for Sunday, April 28

Sr. Jo Baim, Music Director

Today's hymns center around themes of interdependence, cultivating abundance, bearing fruit, and leaning on God's ever-abiding presence in our lives.

Patricia Blaze Clark (1938–2009), the author of the text for our opening hymn, *People of God, Gather Together*, was born into the Roman Catholic tradition, and spent some years as a member of a Congregation of Sisters. Later, she joined the Episcopal Church and received a Master of Divinity degree from the Episcopal Seminary of the Southwest. She served on the staff of Good Shepherd church in Austin, Texas, working in the areas of communication, spirituality, liturgy, and formation. She also taught many workshops centered around spirituality, liturgy, and music, and was a prolific writer of hymn texts. Many of her texts include the women who are so often left out of the church's stories. Her writing is described as economical in words but powerful in description. Today's hymn is a joyful call to exuberant and active worship encompassing everything from song, service, and welcome to healing, praise, and dance. The tune is David Johnson's *Earth and All Stars*—that wonderful, fun hymn we sing every so often that includes boiling test tubes, clashing cymbals, pounding hammer, athletes, singers, and rushing planets, as well as wind and rain (and mentions in every verse that they should all be LOUD)—an ideal choice whose energy pairs perfectly with Clark's text.

Our middle hymn sets a completely different mood. The contemplative text of *O Wheat, Whose Crushing Was for Bread* is by Delores Dufner (b. 1939). Sr. Delores is a Benedictine nun at Saint Benedict's Monastery in Saint Joseph, Minnesota. She has served on the faculties of Saint Benedict's College and Saint John's University in Collegeville, MN. Her hymn texts have appeared in the hymnals and collections of more than twenty publishers. In 1994, she was commissioned to write the libretto for the oratorio *Choose Life, Uvacharta Bachayim,* an interfaith commemoration of the Holocaust. In 2017, she received the *Christus Rex* Award from Valparaiso University. The text of *O Wheat...* comprises three verses that each described the endless circle of life, death, and rebirth using the communion elements of bread, wine, and Christ's death and rising.

Our closing hymn, *How Firm a Foundation*, is an old favorite, and one we sing fairly often. It is one of the best texts I know of to remind us of God's unshakeable faithfulness and presence. This well-known and beloved hymn contains a musicological mystery. At its first publication by John Rippon in his 1787 collection *A Selection of Hymns From the Best Authors*, the hymn was attributed only to K—. Various possibilities have been suggested from among hymn writers of the day such as Keen, Knight, and Kirkham, but each was sufficiently well-known in their time for their other hymns that leaving their name off this one seems very odd. Despite this mystery, the hymn has been a favorite since its publication, with both the north and south singing it frequently before the Civil War, and presidents Theodore Roosevelt and Woodrow Wilson both requesting its inclusion at their funerals. Full of nearly exact Biblical quotes, the text draws from Deuteronomy, Isaiah, 2nd Corinthians, and Hebrews. All the stanzas are filled with the many reasons we have to trust in and rely on God, who will never desert us. Although we at Trinity usually sing this hymn to the tune *Lyons* (#637), I urge you to take a moment on your own and turn back a page to #636, where you will find this text set to a beautiful folk tune originally called *Protection* but now known as *Foundation*.
