





READING FROM THE NEW TESTAMENT

1 Corinthians 8:1-13

Now concerning food sacrificed to idols: we know that "all of us possess knowledge." Knowledge puffs up, but love builds up. Anyone who claims to know something does not yet have the necessary knowledge; but anyone who loves God is known by him. Hence, as to the eating of food offered to idols, we know that "no idol in the world really exists," and that "there is no God but one." Indeed, even though there may be so-called gods in heaven or on earth—as in fact there are many gods and many lords—yet for us there is

one God, the Father, from whom are all things and for whom we exist, and one Lord, Jesus Christ, through whom are all things and through whom we exist. It is not everyone, however, who has this knowledge. Since some have become so accustomed to idols until now, they still think of the food they eat as food offered to an idol; and their conscience, being weak, is defiled. "Food will not bring us close to God." We are no worse off if we do not eat, and no better off if we do. But take care that this liberty of yours does not somehow become a stumbling block to the weak. For if others see you, who possess knowledge, eating in the temple of an idol, might they not, since their conscience is weak, be encouraged to the point of eating food sacrificed to idols? So by your knowledge those weak believers for whom Christ died are destroyed. But when you thus sin against members of your family, and wound their conscience when it is weak, you sin against Christ. Therefore, if food is a cause of their falling, I will never eat meat, so that I may not cause one of them to fall.







News from Trinity's Vestry

The Vestry shares these updates from the January 7 regular vestry meeting:

- **Junior Warden Functions:** Betsy Severtsen will be covering Junior Warden functions until the Vestry selects a new Junior Warden after the Annual Meeting.
- Outsourcing Bookkeeping: The Vestry authorized engaging Battershell & Nichols, CPA to provide bookkeeping and finance services beginning in April 2024. These functions have been covered by volunteers (huge thanks to Treasurer Chris Gruenfeld for doing so much!!) with some staff support.
- Bylaws amendments: At the Annual Meeting of the Parish on 2/4/2024, the Vestry will present two proposals to amend Trinity's Bylaws: (1) Adding provisions authorizing online participation in parish meetings, which will allow hybrid and online meetings without requiring special approval at each Annual Meeting; (2) Changing the number of Vestry members from 12 to 9 (this reflects the reduced number of active members of the congregation).

• **2024 Budget:** The Vestry adopted a budget for 2024. It relies on a 7.5% withdrawal from the endowment, instead of the usual 4-5%. The Vestry will explain the budget and 2024 financial situation at the Annual Meeting.

The Vestry invites all members of the congregation to the **Annual Meeting of the Parish** on **Sunday, February 4, 2024, at 12:30PM**. We will have **ONE WORSHIP service at 10:30AM** on that day, followed by **lunch** and the meeting. The Annual Meeting will be **hybrid** (in-person and on Zoom). Stay tuned for more details!

Update from the Bishop Search Committee

The Bishop Search Committee recently completed Zoom interviews with candidates. As the committee moves forward, it enters a silent phase of the search process to maintain confidentiality. They bid our prayers for the candidates, the committee, and our entire Diocese that the Holy Spirit might guide us in all things with grace and wisdom. Upcoming Key Dates:

Music Notes for January 28, 2024 -- Sr. Jo Baim, Music Director

Our opening hymn today is one we know well: O For a Thousand Tongues to Sing. Truly, we are not doing a **Charles Wesley** marathon, but he is the author of the text for this hymn. Wesley (1707–1788) was unhappy with the trend toward singing only psalm settings in the early Methodist church, and thus set about composing many new hymn texts. This text had particular personal meaning for him. He wrote it to be sung on May 21, 1739 (Whitsun), the first anniversary of his conversion to Methodism. It was first published in A Collection of Hymns for the Use of the People Called Methodists (1780), and its importance in the Methodist Church is shown by its inclusion as the first hymn in the 1980 Methodist Hymnal. Some scholars believe the text was inspired by Wesley's German-born mentor, Peter Böhler, who once said, "Had I a thousand tongues, I would praise him with them all!" Throughout the text, Wesley uses antithesis to emphasize the broadness and expansiveness of salvation. He does this especially in verse five (in our hymnal): "Hear him, ye deaf; his praise, ye dumb, your loosened tongues employ; ye blind, behold your savior come, and leap, ye lame, for joy." As another illustration of the fervor of Wesley's conversion, originally this hymn had eighteen stanzas. The verse we know as the first one is the original verse seven.

Our closing hymn is *Tell Out My Soul*, to the tune **Woodlands**. The text is by **Timothy** Dudley-Smith (b. 1926), an Anglican priest with a long connection to hymn-writing. Dudley-Smith was born in Manchester and ordained in 1959. He served in various positions during his career, including priest, secretary of the Church Aid Foundation, Archdeacon of Norwich, and Bishop of Thetford. Since WWII, he has been part of what has sometimes been called a "British hymn explosion." Dudley-Smith is honorary vicepresident of the Hymn Society of Great Britain and Ireland. He has also received awards from the Hymn Society of the United States and Canada and the Royal School of Church Music. In 2003, he received the Order of the British Empire for his "services to hymnody, and in 2009, he was awarded an honorary Doctor of Divinity degree from Durham University. He has published almost twenty collections of hymns, publishing as recently as 2019 at the age of eighty-three. The current tune used for Tell Out My *Soul* is **Woodlands**, composed by Anglican composer **Walter Greatorex** (1877—1949). He wrote and published the tune in 1916. Greatorex was educated in music at Cambridge University and served as music master at Gresham School in Norfolk until his retirement in 1936.

Our postlude today is based on the tune of our closing hymn (Woodlands). The composer's name is Pietro Cattaneo, and, as I searched for music, I assumed he is a composer of the Renaissance or early Baroque period. However, Cattaneo is only twenty-six years old, and is an active scholar and composer. Born near Como, Italy, he studied with the organist of Milan Cathedral and earned a degree in organ performance. He is currently the resident organist in Cavallasca and a member of the Liturgical Committee for the Diocese of Como. His more than 100 works, especially those for organ, have been performed and recorded all over the world. Cattaneo has a particular interest in the rediscovery of forgotten composers and authors, leading him into the field of musicology. He focuses mainly on 19th-century music from the region of Forli.
