
Whether you are joining us in person or livestream, we are so glad you are here to worship with us on this holy day.





SECOND LESSON 1 Thessalonians 5:1-11

Now concerning the times and the seasons, brothers and sisters, you do not need to have anything written to you. For you yourselves know very well that the day of the Lord will come like a thief in the night. When they say, "There is peace and security," then sudden destruction will come upon them, as labor pains come upon a pregnant woman, and there will be no escape! 

THE BREAKING OF THE BREAD





Music Notes for November 19, 2023

Sr. Jo Baim, Music Director

The poet of our first hymn, *Not Here for High or Holy Things*, is **Geoffrey Anketel Studdert Kennedy** (1883–1929). Of Irish heritage, Kennedy was born into the vicarage family in of a poor church in Leeds.

Nonetheless, he was admitted to Trinity College, Dublin, at the age of 14, although finances prevented his attendance for several years. He began his career as a teacher but was ordained in the Anglican church at Worcester Cathedral in 1908. Known and beloved as a soft-spoken, caring person, there is a delightful story about him giving away his and his wife's bed to an elderly lady in need, and that he recruited his wife to carry the mattress... He became a military chaplain in 1915 and received several medals and honors for his bravery in accompanying the men right to the front, retrieving morphine for first aid stations at the front, and going into no man's land to rescue the wounded and bury the dead. The tune, *Morning Song*, is by Elkanah Kelsey Dare (1782–1826), composer of several tunes in our hymnal. He worked for music publishers, was Dean of the boys at Wilmington College, and beginning in 1817, served as a Presbyterian pastor in Colerain Township, Pennsylvania. Not Here for High and Holy Days contains several themes: appreciation of the beauty of nature, praise and gratitude to God, and a call for generosity to all we encounter.

Continuing the opening hymn's theme of the importance of generosity, our middle hymn is *When the Poor One Who Has Nothing*. The poetry carries the themes that we all have things to share (and the sharing of those who have little is especially blessed), and when we do, the result is abundance and joy for everyone. The poetry and music are by J.A. Olivar and Miguel Manzano. Jose Antonio Olivar is a journalist and poet. After studying at seminary, he has won many prizes and awards for his writings. He now travels the world, meeting and interviewing people from all walks of life. Miguel Manzano was a professor of music at the Conservatory of the University of Salamanca, Spain. He researched folk music and taught music and the performing arts and ethnic music. He also spent many years as a church musician and is internationally recognized for his teaching and composing. The musical style of the hymn is in the form of a *chacarera*—a contemporary Argentine style that begins in 6/8 time and ends with a hemiola (3 beats against 2). To understand hemiola, remember the rhythm of the song from West Side Story: I want to live in America (123 456—12 34 56).

The composer of our prelude and postlude this morning is **Nicolas de Grigny** (1672–1703). In his short career, he left only one collection of organ music and one overture for harpsichord. Born into a musical family, his grandfather, father, and uncle were organists at Rheims Cathedral, and the Basilicas of St. Pierre and St. Hilaire, respectively. From 1692–1695, he was organist at the abbey church of St. Denis in Paris, where his brother was the subprior. In 1695, he married Marie-Magdalejn of France, the daughter of a merchant. In the brief eight years before his death, the couple had 7 children, and baptismal records indicate that the family was in Rheims by 1696. In late 1697, he was appointed organist at Notre-Dame de Rheims, the church where French kings were crowned. Sadly, he would hold this position for only a few years until his early death at the age of 31. His single collection of organ music, published in 1699 and again in 1711, is in two parts. Part one contains settings for parts of the mass, and part two contains settings of five hymns. Our prelude and postlude come from the pieces in the mass setting.
